The survey will be conducted **online**, only takes **20 minutes** to complete, and can be accessed at any convenient time within the survey period on desktop computers, laptops, tablets or smartphones. The online survey will be available in English and 10 other languages including Arabic, Greek, Hakha Chin, Hindi, Japanese, Punjabi, Simplified Chinese, Somali, Turkish, and Vietnamese.

SRC disco date is one to keep in the calendar. The team will have more information out next week. The excitement is building!




## **Health Bones Week**


#### **Loddon Mallee Region Athletics Carnival**


#### Year 7/8 Science

Students in Year 7 and 8 have begun learning how to use TinkerCAD which is a 3D modelling program used to design, modelling and construct 3D items.

Students are using the 3D printers to make components for either their mouse trap, car racers or trebuchets in Science. Families and community members are encouraged to talk with students about their designs to help them explore ways that they can create mouse trap powered cars that will move the furthest distance or the affect of the design of a trebuchet on the distance that it can propel the projectile.

In Science students have been exploring electricity and have used their knowledge to begin designing items for the houses that they are constructing in Technology that light up or spin.













