Year 9 & 10 Rocket Making



Year 9 and 10 students at Pyramid Hill College have competed against each other to engineer a rocket made from paper and tape. The rockets are powered by compressed air. It was a great opportunity for students to explore some of the science behind rockets, developing their understanding of air pressure, force, velocity in order to design a rocket that could fly the furthest. They needed to use their research skills, creativity and problem-solving skills to come up with the best design.

The primary determining factor for performance is drag or friction with the air. Rockets with very big floppy fins have a great amount of drag, and flights are usually short. Very squat nose cones also increase drag. The idea is to design a rocket that is streamlined so that it slices cleanly through the air. Through repeated flights, students discover that small and very straight fins are preferred along with long nose cones.

The winning team for this year's competition was James B, James H and Jeff whose rocket flew a whooping 91m.
