
Frogs in the F/I Room






GEOLOGY ROCKS TALK WITH A ROCK EXPERT

Two geologists Rodney Boucher and James Sorahan visited Pyramid Hill College to talk with the Year 7, 9 and 10 students about fossils, extinctions and evolution.

We found out that Pyramid Hill was formed when molten magma cooled deep below the surface of the Earth. Over a long time cooled from molten magma deep beneath the surface erosion exposed the granite. The granite in Pyramid Hill formed in a ring shaped pattern that heads towards the Murray River. We also learnt about lots of



whacky fossils and what scientists think they may have looked like.
