Duke of Edinburgh Camp

Seven students along with Mr Roberts and Miss Fox headed to Hepburn Regional Park and Mount Franklin. A great time was had by all with many challenging activities were conquered. Here is an account by Mia Braun.



On November 21, six Year 10 students and one Year 9 student went on their final camp to complete the Duke of Edinburgh award. As a collective, the students decided that for their final camp, they would go camp and do activities in Daylesford for a total of two whole days. The first day of camp started off to a rocky start, with a piercingly cold temperature of 8 degrees Celsius. After driving for two hours with Miss Fox and Mr Roberts driving two separate cars, they arrived at Boomerang Ranch.

At this Ranch, the students and teachers would go and ride horses through the muddy terrain, with a slight hint of hail to welcome them. During horse riding, one of the participants, Josephine's, horse decided to go off the beaten path and go under a tree, which led to Josephine having to limbo underneath the branches. After that, they went to Sailor Falls to have a quick lunch before bushwalking to Jubilee Lake. But something quite unexpected happened when they arrived at the Lake. When they popped out of the cars, a peacock came to greet them. And it turns out, there were around five peacocks just roaming around the lake! Anyways, once they walked around the entire lake (and getting muddy shoes and wet socks to boot) they went on a walk around another lake called Daylesford Lake.

With two separate cars and a busy town, Miss Fox and her crew of students got lost and had to refer to Google Maps. Luckily for them, Mr Roberts sent them his location, saving them driving around, trying to find where they were, only for them to be somewhere slightly obvious. This was the first and last time the participants would carry their hiking packs, which was a blessing due to the tracks being incredibly slippery, muddy and wet. After walking for around an hour, they returned back to the cars and made their way to the Chocolate Mill. Although the prices were quite steep for a couple grams of chocolate, one of the participants, Tayah, was able to get her "special chocolate" that she has been excited to get since the planning of the Daylesford camp.

Once the day was coming to a close, the group decided to camp at Lake Jubilee, since the original location for camping (Mt Franklin) was unsuitable, since it was raining on and off the entire day. Thereafter, the group set up their tents and went to cook up their dinner, which was interrupted by the surrounding peacocks, the trangias being slow to heat up and a kookaburra stealing some of Miss Fox's garlic. To end the long and eventful day, the campers went inside to play a few card games and eat some of Miss Fox's delicious smores.
